As reported in a local newspaper covering the opening of the ¼ million dollar educational, vocational, recreational, self-help program for migrant and culturally disadvantaged poor, one small Negro youngster, excited about the presence of a photographer on the campus summed up the objectives of the whole program in five words, after asking to look through the camera. "What do you see?", the photographer asked. Slowly, and with a touch of wonderment in his voice, he replied: "I SEE THE WHOLE WORLD."

Marymount College is in the War On Poverty. From a project grant of \$55,000 in the summer of 1965 to a full scale program in 1966 supported by an Office of Economic Opportunity grant of \$248,128. Through this effort, lauded by Sargent Shriver as "one of the most imaginative programs of its kind", many poor children and adults will get a look at the whole world.

CONTINUING EDUCATION GRANT

Mother de la Croix has been informed by the Florida State Advisory Committee for Title I of the Higher Education Act that the college proposal "Total Woman" has been approved to receive \$10,359.00 of Federal funds.

The Total Woman Project will be conducted during the 1966-67 college term and is designed to explore the changing roles of women in today's world.

Objective of the project will be to involve a representative group of women from the metropolitan area to formulate a long range continuing education plan for the college.

A pilot group, composed of members from cooperating community organizations will meet monthly in seminar sessions to be led by special consultants, who will utilize group dynamics techniques to bring about intercommunication relating to woman's changing roles in the areas of intellectual endeavor, spirituality, family life, creative arts, community action, late careers, and evaluation of the prospects and problems of continuing education opportunity in the community for women.

In April, a three-day workshop will be conducted featuring women speakers who have distinguished themselves in literary - scientific - theological - economic - and social service fields.
