

Christian Renewal Conferences

Marymount College launched its annual series of Christian Renewal Conferences Sunday, October 20, when the Reverend Robert Gleason, S.J., professor of theology at Fordham University, spoke on the subject, "Belief of the Unbeliever".

Author of fifteen books, the latest, "Restless Religious," Father Gleason's works have been translated into French, Dutch, Spanish, Italian, Portugese, Japanese, Hungarian, and Slovak. He has lectured in Europe and the Orient and was recently Smythe Lecturer at the Royal University of Malta.

Internationally known as an American theologian and psychologist who was one of the first to transfer the dynamism of modern European theological thought to the United States, Father Gleason was formerly a staff lecturer at the University of Namur and editor of two publications of modern theological thought, "Eyes of Others" and "Problems and Progress".

Following Father Gleason in the Christian Renewal series will be Reverend Eugene Kennedy, M.M. on Sunday, January 5, speaking on the topic, "Person and the People of God," Reverend John L. McKenzie, S.J., Sunday, January 31, lecturing on, "Idea of the Church: Authority as a Work of Love; and, concluding the conferences, Sunday, February 16, 1969, the first visit to Florida of the outstanding Dutch theologian, Reverend Frans Josef van Beeck, S.J., who will discuss, "Changes in the Church".

LIBRARY CONTRACT AWARDED

Construction of the new library moved a step closer to reality this month when bids were opened and the contract awarded to the Frank J. Rooney Construction Company of Ft. Lauderdale and Miami.

The Rooney bid was \$104,000 more than the original estimated cost of the facility. This increase was due to general economic circumstances which have increased cost throughout the building industry.

In order for the college to avoid further delay in con-

struction of the library a request was made for supplemental funds under Title I of the Higher Education Facilities Act for a grant of one-third of the overrun. This request is now being processed. In seeking supplemental funds the college assured the Government it can raise the additional \$70,000 of the overrun from private contributions.

Everyone reading this newsletter can assist the college in resolving this financial problem by making a gift to the Library Fund Drive.

Roderick MacLeish — dynamic speaker on world affairs — Washington Commentator for the Westinghouse Broadcasting Company and author of the recently published book "The Sun Stood Still" will visit the campus Wednesday, November 20 to deliver a major address on "The Middle East in Transition".

A Communist Affairs specialist, Mr. MacLeish recently returned from the explosive Middle East, where he not only consulted with the leaders in Cairo and Tel Aviv, but broadcast daily both before and during the brief war. Upon his return he was assigned to cover the emergency United Nations sessions at the Security Council and the General Assembly, as well as the Kosygin — Johnson Conferences in Glassboro, New Jersey.

His book "The Sun Stood Still," encompasses the highly dramatic Six Day Israeli War. A world traveler, Rod MacLeish lived for seven years in Britain and has extensive personal knowledge of the Soviet Union, and all eastern European Countries, Laos, Viet Nam, Thailand as well as the Middle East. In Laos he camped with the Communist Pathet Lao guerrillas; covered the Algerian War and has attended all the major disarmament conferences in the last eight years.

Born in Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania, Mr. MacLeish was reared in Illinois and educated at the University of Chicago. His lecture at Marymount is open to the public.

Prayer Workshop

Men and women of all faiths are invited to participate in the Second Ecumenical Prayer Workshop to be held at Marymount College, Friday, November 1, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Dr. Justin Steurer, head of Marymount's Division of Humanities, and professor of Theology, who has just returned from European study, will keynote the morning's session.

The workshop, under the direction of Dr. Susan B. Anthony, assistant professor of theology, aims to help prayer-oriented men and women launch and lead small prayer groups in their own communities.

Men and women from Miami, Fort Lauderdale, Palm Beach, Delray Beach, Pompano Beach, Deerfield Beach and Boca Raton, some of whom launched prayer groups as a result of last year's workshop, will attend.

A model prayer-share group composed of adult and undergraduate Marymount students who have studied with Dr. Anthony, will take place following Dr. Steurer's keynote address. Lunch in the college dining room will be followed by a 1:00 p.m. discussion session in South Hall Lounge.

"Contemporary Contemplation" is the theme of this second workshop. Dr. Anthony is founder of the National Ecumenical Prayer Conference at Notre Dame, Indiana, in 1965, and author of a leading textbook on spontaneous prayer, THE PRAYER - SUPPORTED APOSTLE. Her students, adult and undergraduate, are in charge of planning and arrangements for the workshop, November 1.
