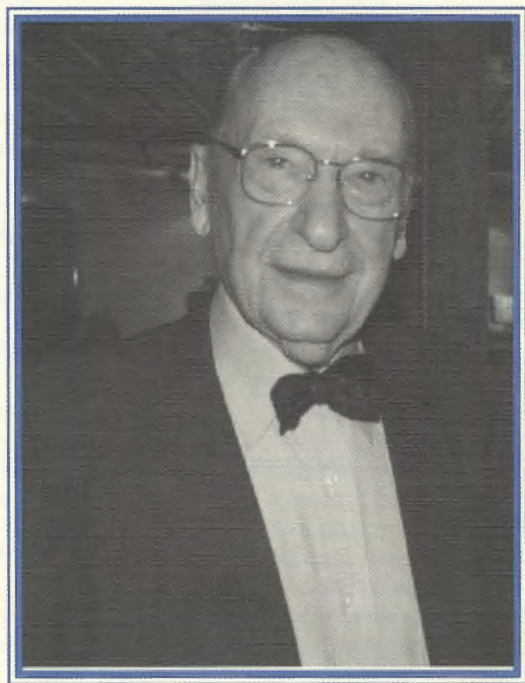

Irving R. Levine



Irving R. Levine, whose bow tie and insistence on the use of his middle initial became trademarks in a 45-year career as an NBC News correspondent, pioneered the coverage of economic news on television and was the first American television correspondent granted permission to reside in, and broadcast from, the Soviet Union during the Cold War.

Upon his retirement from NBC News in 1995, Levine joined Lynn University and helped create and launch the Eugene M. and Christine E. Lynn College of International Communication. He was the college's first dean and now holds the title of dean emeritus, the first person in Lynn University's history to receive the distinction of a dean emeritus title.

Levine scored a number of firsts during his long journalism career. In 1955 he became the first American television correspondent accredited by the Soviet Union as a resident newsman to report from the communist country. He lived in the U.S.S.R. for four years.

In 1971, upon his return to the United States after more than 20 years as a foreign correspondent including service in London, Rome, Vienna, and Tokyo, Levine was named NBC's chief economics correspondent, becoming the first reporter on any network to cover the economy full-time.

In tributes to his long career when he retired from the network in November 1995, Levine was described by the anchors of "NBC Nightly News," the "Today Show" and "Meet the Press" as the "longest running sign-off" in television news.

Levine's broadcasting career did not end with his departure from NBC. Since 1997 he has broadcast commentaries on the PBS-TV program "Nightly Business Report," and earlier was a commentator for CNBC, the NBC business cable network.

The author of four books and numerous magazine articles, Levine's "Main Street, USSR," a lively primer on life in the Soviet Union during the Cold War following the death of Stalin, was on *The New York Times* nonfiction bestseller list for several months in 1959.

In the closing paragraph of his book, Levine had written: "Great changes are in motion in Russia. Education has produced sputniks; it has also created a hunger for contacts with the outside world, for more goods, for a measure of self-expression. The acquisition of property and the dimming of fanaticism act as a brake on adventurous Soviet policies. Time may be on the side of the democratic West in eventually shaping a Russia that is more moderate, more reasonable, more amenable to living and letting live."

With the collapse of the Soviet Union 30 years later, Levine's words proved to be prescient.

When he was assigned to the economics beat in January 1971, Levine would later recall, he rarely got on the air. The economy was running smoothly and there was little headline news. Then, on Aug. 15, 1971, President Richard Nixon imposed wage and price controls in the face of rising inflation and took the United States off the gold standard to stem a run on America's gold hoard. Those actions lifted the economy into the headlines and launched Levine to prominence on NBC news programs.

As part of his economics beat, Levine accompanied Presidents Ford, Carter, Reagan, Bush and Clinton to more than 20 annual international Economic Summit meetings held in England, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, and Canada.

Levine began his career as a foreign correspondent in 1948 in Vienna, Austria, as bureau chief for the former International News Service. Shortly after his arrival in Vienna, he was

briefly held incommunicado by Russian soldiers. He was taken into custody in the four-power occupied city when he ventured into the Soviet zone in an attempt to interview the hospitalized companion of a slain U.S. Marshall Plan official.

At the outbreak of the Korean War in June 1950, Levine was assigned by INS to cover the conflict. He joined NBC News in Korea after moonlighting as a "stringer" broadcaster for the network. As a war correspondent, Levine reported on the seesaw course of the conflict and entered Seoul with one of the first contingents of American troops following the retreat of Chinese and North Korean forces. He also covered the onset of truce talks at Pan Mun Jom, which finally led to an armistice.

In 1952, Levine received a year's fellowship from the Council on Foreign Relations in New York where he pursued studies on the Soviet Union at Columbia University.

News events Levine covered included the world's first heart transplants performed by South African surgeon Dr. Christiaan Barnard in Cape Town in January 1968.

Among other historic moments reported by Levine were: the 1960 uprising in the Belgian Congo; the erection of the Berlin Wall in 1961; the delivery of the first U.S. weapons to the newly formed NATO alliance; the Vatican II Ecumenical Council, and trips by Pope Paul VI, the first international flights by a pope, to the United Nations, the Holy Land, India and elsewhere. Levine contended that the only times he felt safe in the air were on his flights on the same plane with the pontiff.

In March 1979, Levine accompanied Secretary of the Treasury Michael Blumenthal to China for the historic opening of negotiations in Beijing and Shanghai on trade relations between the United States and China. He made a number of subsequent trips to China and other Asian countries.

Levine has been a frequent lecturer at universities, to corporate groups and on cruise ships.

As a news broadcaster and commentator, Levine's trademark bow tie, slow-paced delivery and insistence on the use of his middle initial distinguished him as a recognizable personality and an occasional target of good-natured one-liners by late-night television show hosts.

During a period of economic slowdown, Johnnie Carson jested that things were so tough at NBC that "I saw Irving R. Levine standing by the side of the freeway with a sign reading, 'Will work for bow ties.'"

On another occasion, Carson reported he had seen a perfume on sale in the NBC commissary called "Eau de Irving R. Levine. It had a little bow tie on the bottle."

Levine recalled that he felt vindicated for his middle-initial obsession when George W. Bush was elected and use of the 43rd president's middle initial became standard practice. Levine expressed his approval of the custom in an op-ed piece, which *The New York Times* published under the headline, "His Dubya and My R."

Born in Pawtucket, R.I., Levine graduated from Brown University as a Phi Beta Kappa, and received a master's degree from the Columbia Graduate School of Journalism. He has been awarded honorary doctorate degrees from Brown University, Northeastern University, the University of Rhode Island, Rhode Island College, Bryant College, Roger Williams College, and Lynn University.

Among his many awards are an Overseas Press Club award for radio reporting from abroad, an Emmy citation and Brown University's William Rogers award for service to humanity. In 1956 he was named by the U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce to its annual list of the "Ten Most Outstanding Young Americans."

He is listed in "Who's Who in America," "Who's Who in the World," "Who's Who in Finance and Business," and other editions of "Who's Who."

Levine served in the U.S. Army Signal Corps as a second lieutenant in World War II and headed a photographic team which filmed events during the American occupation of Japan.

Levine and his wife Nancy, whom he married in 1957, have three children—Jeffrey C. B. Levine and Daniel Rome Levine of Chicago, Jennifer J. Levine of Chevy Chase, Md.—and three grandchildren. Irving R. and Nancy J. Levine reside in Washington, D.C. and Boca Raton, Fla.

Academic Regalia

Lending color to the pageantry of the Academic Convocation are the academic robes and hoods worn by the faculty. This regalia reaches back into the medieval ages when it served a functional as well as an ornamental role, separating the learned men from other groups and offering warmth and protection.

In America in the late nineteenth century, a conference was held by representatives of colleges and universities to bring some order and system to the custom of academic dress. Since then, there have been periodic conferences to revise or reconfirm existing practices.

Essentially, undergraduates wear the black robes with the white collars. Holders of the bachelor's degree wear hoods which are lined with the colors of the college conferring the degree and trimmed with the color representing the subject in which the degree was earned. The doctoral robe is adorned with velvet and is also worn with the hood suitably ornamented.

Holders of degrees from foreign universities or religious orders wear the entire academic costume as decreed by the conferring institution.

The following list reflects the colors which will be found on the hoods worn in the Academic Procession at this Convocation and the subject each represents.
