Biographies

Mark Hetzler, artist faculty-trombone

Born in Sarasota, Florida, Mark Hetzler began playing his father's trombone at the age of twelve. He went on to receive a Bachelor of Music from Boston University and a Master of Music from the New England Conservatory of Music. Mr. Hetzler was a fellow at the Tanglewood Music Center and worked under Seiji Ozawa, Simon Rattle and Marek Janowski. He also completed a three-year fellowship with the New World Symphony, under the direction of Michael Tilson Thomas.

As a member of the Empire Brass Quintet, Mr. Hetzler has performed in recital and as a soloist with symphony orchestras in China, Japan, Hong Kong, Taiwan, Germany, Italy, Austria, Malaysia, Singapore, Bermuda, St. Bartholomew, Venezuela and throughout the United States. Mr. Hetzler appears on numerous Empire Brass CDs, including Firedance and a soon to be released recording of the music of Gabrieli, with members of the Boston Symphony Orchestra and the New York Philharmonic.

Former principal trombone of the Hartford Symphony Orchestra, Mr. Hetzler has performed with the Boston Pops, the Florida West Coast Symphony, the Springfield Symphony Orchestra, the Florida Orchestra and the Boston Symphony Orchestra where he made a recording in 1992 of the music of Sibelius with Vladimir Ashkenazy. He has also performed under Luciano Berio, Eduardo Mata, Gunther Schuller, Stanislaw Skrowaczewski and Leonard Slatkin.

Mr. Hetzler has just released two exciting new CD's featuring all his own arrangements and transcriptions. The first CD is titled Serious Songs, Sad Faces, and features vocal music spanning nine hundred years on the subject of sorrow, loss and consolation, with compositions by Mahler, Shostakovich, Brahms, Mozart, Bach, Schubert and Mendelssohn, to name a few. The second CD is titled American Voices. This recording features the mavericks, pioneers and visionaries of American music, including Ives, Barber, Copland, Bernstein, Cowell, Ornette Coleman and Meredith Monk.

Biographies

Mark Hetzler

Mr. Hetzler is a talented arranger, having scored a number of chamber pieces for trombone quartet and brass quintet. One of his arrangements was recorded on the CD Four of a Kind, featuring Mark Lawrence of the San Francisco Symphony and Joseph Alessi of the New York Philharmonic. Mr. Hetzler is featured on Animal Act, a CD of music by Boston composer Evan Ziporyn. He has performed as a concerto soloist with the New England Conservatory Orchestra and the International Trombone Festival Orchestra. Mr. Hetzler performs solo recitals and master classes throughout the world, and recently appeared as an artist and teacher at the Pacific Music Festival in Sapporo, Japan. Mr. Hetzler is currently teaching as artist faculty at the Lynn University Conservatory of Music and at Florida International University.

Lisa Leonard, piano accompanist

A native of Washington D.C., Lisa Leonard enjoys a versatile career as a soloist and chamber musician. In 1990 at the age of 17, Ms. Leonard made her debut with the National Symphony Orchestra in six concerts, at the Kennedy Center. She has appeared as soloist throughout Europe, Japan, Russia and North America with orchestras including Alexandria, Winston-Salem, Raleigh, International Symphony of Germany and the International Music Festival Orchestra with whom she recorded the Shostakovich First Piano Concerto for Hessiches Rundfunk.

An active chamber musician, she has performed with members of the Berlin, Vienna, New York and Cincinnati Philharmonic orchestras in performances featured on National Public Radio's "Performance Today" and "Command Performance" programs. Her love for new music has resulted in several premieres of both solo and chamber music including the recent recording of James Aikmans Sonata No. 3 with violinist Alexander Kerr, concertmaster of the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra.

Biographies

Ms. Leonard has served on the faculties of the North Carolina School of the Arts and the Meadowmount School of music and has participated in the Pacific Music Festival, Gilmore International Piano Festival, Caramoor and the East/ West International Festival where she was assistant director of chamber music. She received her M.M. and B.M. from the Manhattan School of Music, where she was the premiere recipient of both the Rubinstein and Balsam awards, two of the highest awards given. Her former teachers include: Eric Larsen, Marc Silverman, Isidore Cohen, Thomas Schumacher, Cynthia Phelps, David Geber and the Meadowmount Trio.

Undergraduate Degrees

The Conservatory offers baccalaureate and post-baccalaureate level programs of study to music students who have previously had extensive preparation in musical performance. The objectives of the Conservatory are to provide students an opportunity to fully develop a wide array of sensitivities, skills, and knowledge pertinent to their artistic endeavors; and to contribute to the community, region, nation, and world with highly skilled and well-educated instrumental musicians dedicated to careers as performing artists. The program focuses on intensive professional performance instruction, and offers a full and comprehensive curriculum leading to the Bachelor of Music Performance degree or Professional Studies Diploma. Artistic talent and ability are the principal criteria for admission.

Bachelor of Music - Performance (B.M.)

A four-year program of study at the college undergraduate level with specialization in piano, violin, viola, cello, double bass, flute, oboe, clarinet, bassoon, french horn, trumpet, trombone, bass trombone, tuba, or percussion.

The Bachelor of Music program provides intensive training in solo repertoire, chamber music and orchestral playing. Ample performance opportunities and extensive contact with a prestigious faculty of master teachers and performers provide students with the tools they need to reach their full artistic potential.
