

# **Biographies**

Walid Abo Shanab was born in Alexandria, Egypt, and started learning the viola at the age of 17. He studied law for three years at Alexandria University and then left to attend the Cairo Conservatory, where he received his Bachelor's degree in viola performance in 2008 under the tutelage of German-Egyptian violist Usama Farid. Walid participated in the Beethoven festival in Germany with the Cairo Conservatoire Orchestra (led by the famous German conductor Peter Gülke) and worked as a viola player in the Bibliotheca Alexandria Chamber Orchestra for five years (where he also appeared as a soloist). He has attended a workshop for classical music and art management at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., and has performed in master classes with the German violist Christophe Dejardins and the internationally known violist Kim Kashkashian. Walid is currently enrolled in the Professional Performance Certificate program at the Lynn University Conservatory of Music, studying with violist Ralph Fielding.

A native of Brazil, Carina Inoue is pursuing her Master in Music Degree in Collaborative Piano at Lynn University Conservatory under the guidance of Ms. Lisa Leonard. Ms. Inoue is the first prize winner of the VIII Piano Competition Maestro Rodrigo Tavares. A passionate collaborative pianist she has worked as staff pianist at Music Festival of Londrina and the Music Workshop of Curitiba, assisting the conducting classes of Daisuke Soga and Osvaldo Ferreira, and the singing classes of Ângelo Dias and Neide Tomas. Carina has also performed at the International Festival of Music of Campos do Jordão, Music Festival on the Montains of Poços de Caldas and Week of Music of Ouro Branco. She earned her first diploma in solo piano performance from Heitor Villa-Lobos Conservatory of Music and holds a Bachelor's degree from one of the best music universities of her country, Universidade Estadual Paulista "Júlio de Mesquita Filho" (UNESP), under the tutelage of Anna Claudia Agazzi. She has worked with a wide variety of musicians including vocalists Martha Herr and Carmo Barbosa, cellist Joel de Souza, bassists Tibo Delor and Valerie Albright, violinist Eliane Tokeshi, violist Ricardo Kubala and clarinetist Sergio Burgani. She has performed in master classes for Cynthia Phelps, Jeffrey Kahner, Leonard Hindell and Carol Cole. Former teachers include Luciana Sayuri Shimabuco, Gilberto Tinetti, Eduardo Monteiro and Ricardo Ballestro.

# MOSTLY MUSIC: MID-EUROPA/USA CONNECTION

## Thursday, Nov. 15 at 7:30 p.m.

We are all familiar with famous names such as Mozart and Beethoven, but there were other European composers such as Smetena and Dohnanyi who, while less well-known, wrote masterworks and influenced generations of American composers, whose works also will be featured. Concert repertoire includes Dohnanyi's Serenade op. 10: Carol Cole (violin), Ralph Fielding (viola), David Cole (cello) and conservatory students from the studio of Roberta Rust performing works for two pianos, eight-hands: the one movement Sonata in E minor and delightful Rondo in C by Smetana. Conceived and hosted by Marshall Turkin and staged by Jan McArt, Mostly Music features Lynn Conservatory's faculty and students.
