Biographies

Delcho Tenev began his music education in the "Dobrin Petkov" school under Professor Darina Dankova in his hometown of Plovdiv, Bulgaria. He later attended Idyllwild Arts Academy, studying with Professor Todor Pelev, and Indiana University, where he studied with Professor Kevork Mardirossian. He has participated in several prestigious music festivals in the United States- RoundTop International Music Festival in Texas, Spoleto Festival in South Carolina and Castleton Music Festival in Virginia. He has appeared in numerous master classes and collaborated with important music personas, such as Lorin Maazel, Leonard Slatkin, Paul Kantor, Ilya Kaler, Ruggiero Ricci, Schmuel Ashkenazy and Joel Smirnoff, among others. Currently, Delcho is pursuing his Master's degree at the Lynn University Conservatory of Music in the class of Professor Carol Cole.

Degrees in Piano Performance from Yale University in 1993, 1994, and 2000, respectively, graduating with the Yale School of Music's highest honor, the Montreal-born Anne Louise-Turgeon received Master of Music, Master of Musical Arts, and Doctor of Musical Arts Dean's Prize. Prior to her time at Yale, she graduated from The University of Toronto's Faculty of Music (1989) with a Bachelor's degree in Piano Performance, graduating with that school's top honor, the Eaton Award for best graduate. Her principal teachers were Marietta Orlov (U of T), Boris Berman, Claude Frank, Peter Frankl (Yale), and Marek Jablonski (The Banff Centre of Fine Arts). She also holds a Master of Arts degree in Composition from Florida Atlantic University (2010). She performs regularly in the United States, Canada, eastern Europe, and the Russian Federation with her husband, pianist Edward Turgeon in the award-winning piano team DUO TURGEON, which can be heard on compact disc (Vanguard Classics, EMI/Marquis Classics) and is featured in the PBS Documentary "Two Pianos, One Passion". A huge proponent of the chamber music literature, she performs increasingly with local artists and regularly with musicians from Canada and abroad. Anne has held various teaching and collaborative positions at Mount Holyoke College in Massachusetts, Algoma University in Sault Ste, Marie, Ontario, the Harid Conservatory in Boca Raton, Florida, and Florida Atlantic University (Boca Campus) where she currently teaches applied piano, chamber music and composition. In addition, she is frequently called upon to adjudicate local, national, and international music competitions. She currently resides in Lake Worth with her husband and her two daughters, both string students in the Lynn University Preparatory Program.

A crucial figure in the transition to the modern era in Western music, Claude Debussy remains one of the most famous and influential of all composers. He was the most prominent figure in developing "impressionistic" music, although he intensely disliked the term when applied to his own music, which often reflected the activities and turbulence in his life in French literary circles. The concert includes Debussy's Petite Suite with Phillip Evans and Roberta Rust, piano. Conceived and hosted by Marshall Turkin and staged by Jan McArt, Mostly Music features Lynn Conservatory's faculty and students.
