Sara Davis Buechner

Sara Davis Buechner is one of the leading concert pianists of our time, a musician of “intelligence, integrity and all-encompassing technical prowess” (New York Times), with “sovereign command of the keyboard” (Los Angeles Times). Japan’s InTune magazine says: “When it comes to clarity, flawless tempo selection, phrasing and precise control of timbre, Buechner has no superior.”

She was the Gold Medalist of the 1984 Gina Bachauer International Piano Competition, and a Bronze Medalist in the 1986 Tchaikowsky International Piano Competition in Moscow.

With an active repertoire of more than 100 piano concertos ranging from A (Albeníz) to Z (Zimbalist) -- possibly the largest of any living concert pianist -- she has been soloist with many of the world’s prominent orchestras, and given recitals at Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center and the Hollywood Bowl. Ms. Buechner enjoys wide success throughout Asia where she tours annually.

Sara Davis Buechner is the most prominent transgender musician appearing on the classical concert stage today, and has been lauded as a champion of LGBTQ+ rights. She received the Eleanor Roosevelt Award of Brandeis University, and is a member of the National Museum of Women in the Arts.

Dr. Buechner is a Professor of Music at Temple University, has taught and given master classes at prominent music institutions worldwide, and has edited important piano collections for Dover Publications. Her own compositions are published by Muse Press of Tokyo. In 2022 she will mark her 35th year as a dedicated Yamaha artist.



Phillip Evans

In remembrance

Phillip Evans was a great musician, pianist, composer, and a revered and greatly loved and respected teacher to generations of musicians. His true religion was music and his holy trinity was Bach, Mozart, and Beethoven. He served on the faculties of the Manhattan School of Music, the Juilliard School, and Lynn University. He was a Fulbright scholar, recipient of two Rockefeller Foundation grants, and a Loeb Award winner upon graduation from Juilliard. Evans' special affinity for the music of Béla Bartók was acknowledged by the late Pulitzer Prize-winning critic, Harold C. Schoenberg, in his book, *The Great Pianists*.

Evans was born and raised in Grand Rapids, Michigan and lived for forty years in New York before coming to Florida in 1988. He was the youngest child of a family of four children born to Russian-Jewish immigrants. His father, Lazar Evenchik, passed through Ellis Island in 1913 where his name was changed to Louis Evans. Phillip descended from a long line of distinguished musicians, his father was a cellist and grandfather a cantor, from whom he received his Jewish name Feivel. He had an extraordinarily spontaneous sense of humor, strong intellect, and loving personality. He was avidly interested in politics and world affairs from a very young age and read two daily newspapers his entire life. Phil was a fanatic New York Giants fan and loved all sports. He also loved gambling, including harness racing, poker and blackjack and he was an excellent chess player, once lasting 12 moves against Bobby Fischer.

His deeply musical soul and great humor are always missed. This recital is dedicated to his memory.
